A FINAL NOTE

"Who is this mysterious stranger among you?" This is the question I posed in my first newsletter article at St. John's in 2006. By now I hope I am not so mysterious and certainly not a stranger. This congregation has grown so very dear to me in the last 13 years. I thank you all for your love and support as it has been my joyous privilege to serve among you.

My journey to this point began many years ago while an active member of a church of another denomination. I became troubled by the theology which emphasized what I was to do rather than what God has done for me. It was burdensome. The Gospel was not clearly preached and taught, and I was confused as to why it was called Good News, when there did not seem as though there was Good News to share.

Someone pointed me to the radio station KFUO from the campus of Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. From there I heard the clear Good News through the daily bible study and *Issues*, *Etc.* I learned that infant baptism had been practiced in the Early Church and that "decision theology" (the idea that everyone must decide for Christ and ask Him into his heart) did not enter the church until the early 19th century. There were Christians before 1800, I thought, so how did they become believers if they did not make a decision? Blessed be God! I learned the marvelous truth that conversion is God's work through Baptism and that the Holy Spirit keeps me in the true faith. It is not up to me to struggle to be good enough.

In 1995, I left my church, feeling like a traitor to my parents, but knowing that God was guiding me into truth. I was catechized at Trinity Lutheran Church (which interestingly was across the street from my church) and then confirmed in February 1997. At an organ workshop in Fort Wayne, I met Deaconess Pam Nielsen. She told me about the deaconess program and gave me brochures. Over the next three years, I kept those pamphlets and read them over and over. I thought it would be wonderful to be a deaconess, but my life situation did not lend itself to pursue that path.

In 2002, my marriage ended, and I needed a way to support myself. Out came those brochures, and September of that year found me on the campus of Concordia Seminary St. Louis, taking theology classes with 25-year-old young men studying to be pastors. Some of those young men were from Africa, India, and China. What an enriching experience! After receiving an M.A. in systematic theology, I went to the seminary in Fort Wayne for deaconess training and some church history classes, and I was one of the first two deaconess students to be sent out into the field from that institution.

St. John's was my place of internship, after which the church graciously called me to be your deaconess in 2006. The picture of the position has somewhat evolved as the needs of the congregation were matched with my gifts and time. I have had many doubts as to my diaconal abilities. There are so many women in

this congregation who are extravagantly hospitable. I have worked with women who pour out compassion in spiritual and human care. There are women at St. John's who excel in teaching the faith. I am constantly awed by them. One thing I remember from my training is the phrase, "there are lots of people who serve the congregation, but the deaconess is there to see that the job gets done." I hope I've done that in some way.

Looking back over my years here, I can only boast of all kinds of flaws and failures, and I own those. The successes are the result of God's work through Jesus Christ by the Holy Spirit. I do not take credit for good results, and I cannot do anything in my own power about my flaws. I am helpless either way. Why did God choose me as His own child? Why has He chosen me to work in His vineyard? Only out of His mercy and grace.

I am most grateful to God and to the members of St. John's for giving me this opportunity to receive God's gifts, to express my faith, and to serve among you.

2018 STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN PLEDGE SUNDAY IS JUNE 24

Once again, we come to the time to initiate our *annual stewardship* campaign. The pledge period for this campaign runs July 1 – June 30 of 2019. Our *annual stewardship* campaign raises funds for our annual operating budget, while our "Paid in Full" campaign works to retire our building debt. Pledge cards for the annual stewardship campaign are totaled and form the basis for establishing our next calendar year operating budget.

You will soon or may already have a letter explaining our annual campaign along with your pledge cards. We will also have bulletin inserts on Sundays in June to provide further information. Biblical stewardship education is an education in living in one's Christian vocation, not just or even primarily, to raise money. The goal of biblical stewardship isn't meeting the budgetary needs of the church, but growth in our vocation as Christians and within the Christian vocation, the joy of giving in spontaneous but intentional thanksgiving for God's goodness and mercy.

As in the past, we are sending out the pledge cards early to give members/families time for prayerful consideration of their commitment for 2018. Handing in a completed commitment card during the June 24 service will be completely voluntary. If you're unable to attend on Stewardship Sunday, you may leave your completed commitment card in a sealed envelope in the collection plate or in the church office at a future date.

Finally, we'd like once again to assure you that there will be no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. We only ask that you give prayerful consideration to how best to use the gifts we all receive from God. St. John's is truly blessed with a giving congregation.


