It is adorned with a cross and five brads for the five wounds of Christ. At other times of the year, the Paschal candle stands near the font. At funerals, the paschal candle is lit as a reminder that the baptized person who dies with faith in Christ will rise again to eternal life.

Beauty and Benefits of Cursive Writing in Classical Education

The three characteristics of classical education are truth, goodness, and beauty. They are woven into the curriculum and daily instruction within the classroom for the purpose of enlightening a child's mind towards the things of God, because God is the source of all three: truth, goodness, and beauty.

Beauty can take various forms in architecture, music, art, nature, good literature, and the list goes on. God creates beauty. And we, as children of God, should seek to imitate that in our language, actions, and disciplines. One of the disciplines in our classical school is penmanship, specifically cursive writing. Not only does proper handwriting demonstrate an aesthetic sense of beauty, but it also provides many practical purposes that benefit the learning process.

Connecting letters through cursive increases the speed of writing, which in turn improves attention span and the ability to excel. It also improves neural connections in the brain by using both sides. Not only is the mind involved in writing cursive, but the arms, hands, and eyes are also required for focus, discipline, organization, patience, and accurate attention to detail.

Believe it or not, first grade is the ideal time to begin cursive training. Perfect printing will come later, but good cursive techniques are easier to learn especially at an earlier stage when they have the capability to do so. This impacts early fine motor skill development and ability to focus on content. This also prevents the difficult transition from printing to cursive in a later grade. Plus, the earlier to introduce this form of beauty in handwriting, the better! It is pleasing to children and such a delight to learn.
